Introduction

As part of the observation of the centennial of the county in 1970, the McPherson County Historical Society and other county historical organizations convened at a banquet to honor the descendants of pioneer families in the county. Persons throughout the county were invited to submit names of their pioneer ancestors, as well as documents and other historical information, for inclusion in this register of pioneers.

Under the leadership of Linn Peterson (1920 - 2010), McPherson historian and long-time president of the MCHS, the number of pioneers added to the register increased steadily and now numbers over 1,000.

Peterson added valuable historical information to many entries in the register over the years. These include newspaper clippings, correspondence, and his own notes. Thus, a listing for a particular individual may include material about other members of the family as well.

Over 40 years later, the McPherson County Historical Society and the other county historical organizations continue to induct families into the register at their annual dinner. Now, the many volumes of the register are available to the public online in their entirety via the web site of the McPherson Public Library, as well as in print and in the McPherson Room of the library.

How to Use This Volume

The application forms and any accompanying information for each pioneer are arranged in the volume as indicated by the contents page. The names are listed as submitted by the family member completing the application. The name of a spouse may be found in the material under a particular name even though it is not listed in the contents.

Women who were inducted into the register singly are listed by their married name, if applicable, with their maiden name in parenthesis. There also are typically see references under the maiden names directing the user to the married name.

Titles and nicknames are listed in parenthesis.

Many immigrants changed their names upon arriving in America. If the family provided both names, the main entry for the person is listed in the contents under the American name with see references under the original name. Note that last names where both the original and American names are similar, such as Jansson – Johnson, Nilson – Nelson, Olafson – Olson, Bjork – Burk do not have see references under the original name.

The date column indicates the year that the pioneer settled in McPherson County, and the township column indicates the township.

Please remember that the great majority of the information included in this volume was provided by family members. Neither the McPherson County Historical Society nor the McPherson Public Library are responsible for its accuracy.

ship, and according to custom, after he had completed his apprenticeship he traveled one year as a journeyman, but at the end of that time he decided to move to Kansas.

The two half-brothers of our subject, Henry and Charles Achilles, had already settled in Little Valley Township, McPherson County, in 1873, and they invited him to take a view of the country. The appearance of the land and the surrounding country suited him and he decided to move to Kansas with his bride, having married Miss Hannah Wendt, the daughter Of Christian Wendt, who homesteaded the land where the town of Inman now stands.

To this union were born Hannah (my Mother), Christian F., Albert A., Fred W., Emma and Theodore. Three children died in childhood and two in infancy.

Mr. Aschman was a strong Democratand heartily supported the principles of his party. In religious matters he was a member of the Luthern Church.

Of additional interest is the fact that Mr. Aschman opened the first post-office in Inman March 27, 1887, although he still resided on his farm, four and one-half miles northeast of town. My mother, Hannah, being the oldest of the children was his assistant in the post-office

Grandpa Aschman died Nov. 11, 1925 in Hutchinson, and is buried in the Inman Cemetery, which is, ironically, part of the section of land Grandma Aschman inherited from her father, Christian Wendt. Later Grandma sold it to Inman for the North Cemetery.





Benjagin P. Becker was born on August 19, 1857 to Peter and Anna (Eck) Becker in Antchofka, Poland-Russia of German descent. In 1874 he came with his parents on the ship "VATUERLAVD" meaning Patherland. They arrived in Philadelphia on December 25, 1874. They then yourned to Kansas arriving on a cold Winter day with the them wheter registering twelve degrees below zero. Luty Lee Enns White had gotten this form from someone at Inman, but she didn't have as much formation for it as I did so she gave it to me complete. To the best of my knowledge it is accurate as far as it goes. I don't know the section number, but the information I have says that C. Enns bought it from a homesteader who had come from Iowa two years earlier and homesteaded the quarter. "He came to Kansas with his family in a covered wagon displaying the sign Kansas or Bust and was ready to go back to lowa with the sign upside down." The purchase also included a wagon, team of horses and needed farm implements, according to the information I have, which comes from a letter written by H. T. Enns, the 4th son of C. Enns, in 1950. I don't know the source of his information!





Biography of Forgest and Mellie Ferris

Forcest Clinton Ferris came to Kansas in 1878 to teach school in Rice County. The next year in 1879 he began to pay on land in McPherson County and in December he returned to his birth county and state - Black Hawk County, Iowa where his parents, wife-to-be and her parents lived near Hudson, lowa. Forrest Ferris married Mary Florence "Mellie" Aurner on Christmas Eve, 24 December 1879. Following their marriage they came to Kansas to build their home and raise their family in Hayes Township of McPherson County. Their names appear in the 1880 census for that township. They lived the remainder of their lives and died in McPherson County.

In the 1880 Census for Hayes Township of McPherson County Forrest and Mellie Ferris lived on NE $\frac{1}{2}$ 15-20-5 of the township. (His name was spelled Forest in the census.) Forrest was age 25 and Mellie was age 21. (Her name was spelled Nellie in the census.)

Forrest Clinton Ferris was born 5 December 1854 near Hudson, in Black Hawk Township of Black Hawk County, Iowa. He died 21 November 1941 and is interred at McPherson Cemetery in McPherson. He was the second son, and one of eight children, of John Dual and Louisa Alice (Jackson) Ferris.

Mary Florence "Mellie" Aurner Ferris was born 26 March 1859 in DeKalb County, Illinois. She died 28 June 1952 in McPherson and is interred at McPherson Cemetery. She was one of four children of Orlando James and Isabel Jane (Burchfield) Aurner.

Forrest and Mellie Ferris were the parents of six children: Hugh Clinton, a pharmicist; Arba Clayton, an electrical engineer and farmer; Orlando James, a dentist; Myrtle Inez, a missionary to China-a nurse; Rálph J., a farmer; and Carl Ray, a physician.

After Forrest retired from the farm in Hayes Township they Ferris's moved to McPherson and lived at East Kansas Avenue until their deaths. Their son Arba his wife Blanche lived on the farm until Arba's death in 1966. Their children Madeline Janice, Maxine, Robert Clayton, Lois Juanita, and Blanche Lucile were raised on the farm though Lois Juanita died in infancy. Several family members are currently McPherson County residents.



Peter A. Flickner born Nov. 3, 1853

One of his sons, Edmund Flickner was frequently a teacher in the one-teacher schools in Southern McPherson County. He also was a teacher of significance in the Preparatory School in the Hoffnuncsau Church Community which bordered the Moundridge community on the west.

Peter A. Flickner contributed to Canadian Mennonite Board of Colonization thru grants or loans for immigrants from Russia (1925).

He was involved in the building and maintaining of a college in the interest of higher Christian education under the auspices of the Mennonite Church of North America through the agency of Bethel CollegeCorporation (1887)

P. A. Flickner possessed talent in music, he was known to have 'perfect pitch', not required to use tuning fork or instrument to begin any song. He was song leader in Hopefield- Eden Church for many years.



Peace be unto her memory.





Dr. J. S. Graves, another pioneer, located in Imman when the town was first starfed, arriving on horseback and carrying his entire equipment in his saddlebags. He was born, reared and received his high school education in Missouri. He gra uated from the Iowa College of Physicians and Surreons. Keokuk, Iowa, in the spring of 1885, began practice in Williamstown, Mo., but came to Mc-Pherson in the fall of 1886. In March 1887, he came to Inman, where he continued to practice until his death in 1915.

Dr. Graves was married in 1888 to Miss Emma Brooks of Illinois. They

had four children.

He is remembered as a public spirited citizen who took time from his professional duties to assist whole-heartedly in any project having as its object the betterment of the community. His death was a real lose to the community.

Well known Physician Passes Away Friday Morning At McPherson.

The harvest of human life goes on. The latest addition to the countless millions of the victims of the mysterious reaper, is none other than our fellow citizen, Dr. J. S. Graves. He was hardly past the period of his prime but was still active and influential in his profession, in business and in the civil and social affairs of our town and county. He was the pioneer physician of Inman. Hundreds of people today within a score of miles of his office owe their lives to his skill and honesty in treating their various maladies. His life is as a prominent thread woven into the fabric of the local history. His judgment as a city councilman had much to do with the shaping of the present and the future success career of Inman He was a member of good standing of the Odd Fellows, the Modern Woodman of America, the Benevolent and Protective Order. of Elks, the Masonic Order and the Order of the Eastern Star. He leaves a comfortable estate to his family, the honest accumulation of many years of his profession and good management. His suggestions and work in the reclaiming of the Chain Lakes region added thousands of dollars to the community without any returns outside of his own holdings. His place as an active physician can not be filled as he filled it. Time alone can fill the prominent nich he has so suddenly left vacant.

His death was caused by an internal hemorrhage. He has been subject of a surgical operation for gall stones and several ulcers and was on fair road to recovery when the unfortunate break occurred.

Dr. John Stevens Graves was born at Lewistown, Missouri, October 31st, 1861. He was graduated from the Keokok Medical College, of Keokok, Iowa, May 24th, 1885, and practised his profession for one year at Williamstown, Missouri. He came to Mc-Pherson late in the year 1886, where he continued his medical service; moving to Imman in the spring of 1887, where he has continued his work putil his death.

He was married on October 24, 1888, to Emma Bell Brooks, of White Hall, Illinois. To this union were born foor children Leona S., Brooks W., Charles W., and Dwight R. Graves. He is survived by the widow, the children and one half brother, William L. Graves of Innam.



One term, 1896 to 1898. Retired farmer. Known to everyone as Uncle Wallace.


W. W. Graves came to Inman, Kansas, soon after the beginnings of Inman. He was one of its active citizens, served as mayor and in other capacities, but in later years declined offices because his hearing troubled him. He had come from a timber country, and the trees of Inman never had a warmer friend than Uncle Wallace. He planted more trees here than any Inman citizen, and a tree in Uncle Wallace's care was sure to grow and prosper. Even when he was sick he was seen to saw wood at times. It was hard for him to stay indoors and to separate himself from the neighbors. the trees and the wood pile. He liked to meet his neighbors and to chat with them, and Imman mourns over his departure.

W. W. Graves.

W. W. Graves was born June 7, 1835; died Feb. 9, 1910. He spent the first part of his life with his parents in Lewis county, Mo. On Feb. 3, 1859, he was married to Martha A. Wright of Labelle, Mo. To this union there were born two children, one son, Dr. J. S. Graves of Inman, Kan., and one daughter, who passed on before, May, 5, 1886. His wife having died Oct. 18. 1862, W. W. Graves was again married July 30, 1871, to Mary E. Wright of Illinois, and to this union was born one son, Wm. L. Graves, who now lives in Byron, Obio. Mary E. died Sept. 3, 1874, and on April 15, 1879, W. W. was married to Mrs. Sarah C. Job, who still survives him.

The deceased united with the Christian church in early life, and was a member of the I. O. O. F., where he held high official positions. He was an old soldier, although he never identified himself with the G. A. R.

Uncle Wallace, as he was generally known, was failing in health for several years, but was very ambitious, never giving up until! the last. He was loved by all who knew him, and his memory will be cherished by all his friends. He leaves to mourn his departure his wife, Mrs. S. C. Graves, two sons, Dr. J. S. Graves and Wm. L. Graves, two sisters, Mrs. L. K. Haydon and Mrs. B. F. Martin, three brothers, Steve Graves, Mart Graves and Eli Graves, and a host of relations and friends. Graves, who lives in Arkansas. was unable to be present. The funeral services were conducted by Elder Berkeley of McPherson, Feb. 11, 1910.



Nels Hanson was the son of Hans Bengtsson & wife Bengta Jeppasdotter of Wilshult, Jemshog parish, Blekinge, Sweden. He was born 07 March 1829 and in 1850 married Johannah Larsdotter. Seven children were born in Gammalstorp, Sweden.....2 of which died as infants and are believed to be buried there. Two more children were born in Kansas. Probably in the fall of 1869, the family emmigrated to the United States. They remained in the Galesborg, Illinois area prior to settling in Kansas in 1870. In this year they first appear on U.S. Census records (Walnut Township, Saline County, Kansas) and were received into the Salemsborg Lutheran Church congregation.

His brother Carl Hanson also emmigrated with his family to the southern Saline County area. Carl was instrumental in the chartering of the Assaria Lutheran Church.

Nels & Johannah received their land through a quick-claim deed which gave them all the rights of homesteading. This was purchased for \$1.00 from an Illinois couple who had originally claimed the land through the Homestead Act....but never came to Kansas. This land is 1 mile west and 1/2 mile north of present day Assaria and is still farmed by Hanson descendents of Assaria.

Nels died 10 May 1872 shortly after his settling in Kansas. It is believed Johannah and her children fulfilled Homestead requirements. Their church memberships were eventually moved to the Assaria congregation. Johannah died Ol Feb. 1899. Both are buried in the Assaria cemetery.

She spent several days visiting us while we lived at "Cedar Grove." One day I was planning to have chicken for dinner and waiting for Tut to chop off its head. She caught the chicken, twisted it's head off, plucked the feathers, and cut it up ready for frying. She loved to talk. I really enjoyed her because she had such an interesting, hard life.
- 7. Esther Wilhelmina, "Aunt Minnie," married George Mattics, a "railroad man." He worked in an office in Kansas City, Missouri. They had one daughter, Dorothea, the only Johnson Cousin that we've really kept in touch with except for the Moors Families.
- Petrus Emanuel was Tut's dad. Everyone called him Petey. 8. He was so kind to me; we had many long visits. While drinking coffee, he would love to put a little sugar with a little coffee in a spoon to feed Duane and Bill when they were small. Since his birthday was near Thanksgiving (November 2nd,) we would usually have a big dinner then since we went to my parents on Thanksgiving. I remember so well our last birthday dinner. We'd invited Charles and Mable Moors and family. I tried to fix all his favorite foods: Roast pork, mashed potatoes, gravy, vegetables, etc. - of course angel food cake and home made ice cream. He appreciated it so much! Several days later he went to Wesley Hospital in Wichita, where his illness was diagnosed as "Tropical Sprue," a condition of the pancreas. He was back and forth to the hospital until February, 26, 1940, when he passed away.
- 9. Lydia Theodora Alfrieda, "Aunt Johnnie," was a beautiful, tall, dark haired woman with the pretty "Johnson eyes." She was married to Bill Gane, who was a conductor on the Rock Island Railroad. The Johnsons knew when he would come by their farm. They would meet the train just to wave at him, or sometimes Aunt Johnnie would send a message with him.

The Johnson family came from Smoland, Sweden. When they first came to the United States, they settled at Woodhull, Illinois. In 1880 they moved to New Gottland, north of McPherson, Kansas. Shortly thereafter, the McPherson area became their home - actually several miles southwest of McPherson.

The Johnson family were called the "Singing Johnsons." When Duane began singing in our Church Choir at Trinity, several of the older members commented that it was good to have a "Singing Johnson" once more and told us that Grandpa Johnson's family loved to sing.

On September 21, 1897, Grandpa Carl A. Johnson was killed when his young team of horses bolted and upset the wagon he was riding in and threw him out.

In those days, the deceased would "lie in state" at the home of some relative. I noticed that from their obituaries Grandpa Carl Johnson, Grandma Christina Johnson, Uncle John Johnson, Tut's brother Bill, and Tut's father were all placed in Tut's parent's home where they had memorial services for them. This room was just off the dining room, and had many windows facing west.

After Grandpa Carl's death, Grandma Christina and several of her daughters bought a house on East Euclid, where they lived for some time. Then she moved to Kansas City, Missouri where she lived until she passed away November 10, 1913.





An Interview with Fanny McClain

By Carl Kasey

Sept. 4, 1977

Fanny McClain was asked to trace the Kasey relation, starting back as far as she could remember. All information shown in parenthesis, (), was inserted by Carl Kasey

My Grandpa Kasey was James C. Kasey and my Grandma's maiden name was Wright. She was Mary Wright before she was married. Grandpa Kasey died in 1893. They had ten children, five boys and five girls and they were all raised to be grown except one, a little girl between Uncle Scott and my father. All the rest lived to be grown and married. I can give you their names.

Uncle Bose, Robert Thomas, was the oldest, and he married Sue Gibbs and they had three girls. I think they had two children they lost in Missouri before they came to Kansas. I think they died when they were small children. And the three children they raised were Willie Kinsinger, Mamie Kinsinger, and Elsie Burns, and they were all married here and raised their families here. Elsie never had any children, and Willie and Jake had one boy, Lee, and he is still living in Florida. Mamie and John had three boys, Otho, Harold and Ralph, and they are all gone. Otho was the oldest and he died here, and Harold died in a car and train accident out here by Conway, in the summer of 1909. Ralph married and lived as a dentist in Blackwell, Oklahoma, and his widow is still living.

Aunt Sally was the next child of James and Mary Kasey, and she married John Powell, and they moved to Texas. They had three children, Elizabeth, Early and Kate. I can't tell you any more than that, since I didn't see any of them.

The next was Uncle Sam Kasey, and he married ..., I can't think of her name, but they were married only about two years and he died. His wife had been married once before and they had a little girl, and one of the Vinyards raised her. Then that lady married a Burkholder and had a big family. She lived to be a real old lady.

Then next was my father and his name was James Lewis. And he married Florence Fields and they had five children in all. The oldest was Emmett and he was four and a half when they came to Kansas, and they had another child nearly three and he died when they had been here nearly a week. He is buried right out here. And then Hugh was born in 1887 and I came along in 1890 and Lillian was born in 1906. Emmett was married and his first wife died. The were married in 1903 and she died in 1907. He then went to Texas in 1908 and then he remarried in 1914.

Emmett never had any children of his own, but his second wife had a boy. That boy is still living and I still hear from him. Hugh married Marsh Cook from Ottawa and they had one daughter ... they had two, but they lost the second child at sixteen months. They raised the one daughter, Dorothy, and she lives in Denver. Hugh's widow is still living and is past 90 and living in Tulsa in a Methodist Manor. She has been there ten years. She went there in November after Hugh died in July. He has been dead ten years. Their daughter, Dorothy, who lives in Denver, has two daughters, one married while they lived in Canada. You see they lived in Canada for eighteen years, and this girl married a Canadian and has two children. The other girl is a teacher in Ann Arbor, Michigan, at the university. This daughter has a PhD in Philosophy. She finished high school in Calgary, then went to Palo Alto and graduated there, and then she went to the University of Pennsylvania and finished there. Then she went to Cornell and went to school some more and got her PhD. Then she taught in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania schools and then she went to Ann Arbor Michigan. And then I came along, and I was married in October 1915 to Hugh McClain and he died on Nov. 16, 1951. I have two children, Florence, and she was married to Charles Crow on March 31, 1946. They live in Hutchinson and have no children. I have one son. Herbert, who lives here and he married Marcelyn Chappel on January 19, 1953. They have one daughter, Karen, who was married on June 23, 1974 to Pat McGee. She is teaching in Pratt, Kansas, and Pat is teaching at Great Bend at the college. My sister, Lillian lives in Denver and she does not have any children. So that takes care of us.

The next was Uncle Scott Kasey and he came to Kansas in 1883 and he and my father bought that home place down there. They got here on Friday and he and my father walked across the field the next day and bought the place. Of course the railroad wasn't there then. Momma's youngest child was taken sick and they sent for the doctor and Moomaws had come with them, and we were all in the Neighbors house. The Neighbors lived in the first quarter south of that. There were three families with children and this little boy had diptheria. So they asked the doctor if it would hurt the child to move him up to this other house and he said not as much as living in the house with all the other children. Our family moved up to the other house, but he died the next Friday of diptheria. Fannie Fields was born the next day after my folks got to Kansas and she lived where Lee Carlson now lives. Fannie Young's mother heard about the family down the road who had just lost a little child, so she asked to have her bed rolled over to the window so that she could watch them go by on the way to the cemetery. She told Momma that later when she got acquainted with her. Then in 1887 Uncle Scott went back to Virginia and he and Aunt Bettie Day were married the 27th of February, 1887. They came back here and then that fall, I think, they bought the place across the road east; that is where I was born, where Rodney Swanson now lives. That fall my father and mother and Hugh and Emmett went back to Virginia and stayed all winter, and when they came back they stayed across the road east and took that place, and Uncle Scott and Aunt Bettie lived on the west place. Roy was born on September 6, 1988. They lived there until after Howard was born. Howard was born in July and they went back to Virginia in November of 1890, because that is when the house burned. Grandma Kasey was living

with Uncle Scott and Aunt Bettie at that time. I don't remember that because I was only about three months old when all that happened. family stayed in Virginia from 1890 to 1899 and came back here the first day of April in 1899. Your father, Roy, was eleven years old at that time, and Howard was nine, because Howard and I were just six weeks apart. Howard was married to Helene Taylor and he died in November of 1941. They had no children. Your dad, Roy, was married the first time in 1910, that is when Uncle Scott and Aunt Bettie moved to town. Then Jennie died in 1913 in June during warm weather, I know. In 1916 (on April 30) he married (Frances Linholm). Then Duane was born in Dec. 1919. and Betty was born in Sept. 1921, and you, Carl, were born in Nov. of 1922. (On May 4. 1947, Duane married Rosemary Pattison Duguid who had a son, Gregory, by her first marriage. They now have a daughter, Marilyn, who married Loren Unruh on Dec. 7, 1968. Marilyn and Loren live in Galva and have two sons named Scott and Chris. Gregory married Kathy Kilhefner on June 3, 1967 and they live in Topeka. They have a daughter named Laura. Betty Kasey is a librarian in the State Capitol building in Topeka. Carl married Betty Bedell on May 8, 1949, and they have two children, Karen, born on January 16, 1952, and Dennis, born on April 7. 1954. Karen and her husband, Mike Achilles, live in Hesston and have two boys, Chris, born on May 8, 1971, and Ryan, born on February 27, 1975. Dennis is not married and lives in McPherson.)

The next younger than Uncle Scott was Aunt Emma Odineal. I think her husband, David Odineal, was quite a bit older than she, anyhow, she had Dave and Mamie, and Ben, and Roberta, and Early. Dave died before his mother did, and when Aunt Emma died, Uncle Scott went back to Virginia and brought Roberta and Early out here to live with him and Aunt Bettie. Early lived with Uncle Scott and Roberta lived with Uncle Frank for a time and then she came to our house and was there for some time. She was just a little older than Lillian, but I think she was in the same class in school. And then later Dad went to Texas; he took a carpenter with him and went down to Texas to build a house for Hugh and Marsh, for you see they went to Texas when they were first married. Well, that wasn't very convenient for us to have someone extra to get to school. and Uncle Scott and Aunt Bettie were in town by that time, so she went to Aunt Bettie's and stayed the rest of the time until she finished school. Now I know that Ben is dead, and Early and Roberta and Mamie are dead, I expect, but I can't tell you about those three because I just don't know; I have just lost track of them entirely. Early was in Nebraska and Roberta was in California the last I knew and Mamie was always in Virginia. She never did come here to stay; she did come here to visit.

And then next to Aunt Emma was Uncle Frank Kasey and he married Jessie Moore in June of 1905 and they never had any children. He died in January of 1914.

And next was Aunt Molly. She married Ben Semones and they never had any children. She came out here and was here in 1914, but she went back and finally lived in Florida. She died in Sebring, Florida, and I can tell you that it was in January of 1951.

The youngest girl was Cora Alberta; they called her Bertie. She married Luther Bell. She had lost two little children and then she died when the third child, a little girl, was born. Her name was Ola Bell. Then Luther remarried, and I know that Ola is dead. This takes care of all the children of James C. and Mary L. Kasey.

Question: Would you tie in the relationship of the Spence family to the McClain family? Homer spence married Maggie McClain. Maggie was my husband's sister.

Question: Would you trace the relationship of Sam Fields to your parents: Sam Fields' father was my mother's brother. My Mother was a Fields.

Question: How do the Walkers tie in to the relationships? Mrs. Walker, Aunt Sue Walker, wife of Jerome S. Walker, was Momma's sister. Of the original Fields family there was Uncle Sam, Sam Fields' father, and then Aunt Sue Walker and a Mrs. Huddleston were twins. Mrs. Huddleston never came west to live. They were Momma's sisters. And then Momma; that was all of that family. They were all born in Bedford County, Virginia. Uncle Sam came out here in the summer after my folks came in March of 1883. He was just tickled to death of the country. He said I'm going back and have a sale. So he went back and had a sale and came out here in February and bought the farm where the Case boy now lives. And Aunt Sue came with six children in May and Sam was born that September of 1884. There were ten in the Fields family, five boys and five girls.

Question: Would you connect Leland Moore into the Kasey family? Well,
Leland is a brother to Frank Kasey's wife; she was a Moore,
Jessie moore. Leland Moore is still living in Newton.
Barbara was a great neice, I think, of Jessie. Jessie had
a sister named Pearl, and I think that Barbara was her granddaughter, if I have it straight. I never knew her.

Question: Were the Kaseys related to Mrs. Lawrence that lived on south Main St.? Not a bit in the world. Uncle Frank Kasey's wife was related. Mrs. Lawrence raised Virginia Morris and she also raised Ruth Colburn who both live here. Ruth Colburn was her neice, but Virginia Morris' mother was a Voshell. Mrs. Lawrence raised Virginia as a foster child; she never adopted her...neither one of them, because I remember when she didn't have either one of them, and I remember when she did have them.

The above report is not intended to be a complete history of the Kasey family. Any errors are no doubt those of the writer and certainly not mistakes in the wonderful memory of Mrs. Fanny McClain.


OBITUARY 113

Robert Thomas Kasey was born in Bedford county, Va., Nov. 24, 1845 and departed this life at Fort Scott, Kansas, April 18, 1927, at the age of 81 years 4 months and 24 days. At the age of 17 he enlisted in the Confederate Army and served until the close of the Civil War. He was with those who with Robert E. Lee declared the cause of the Confederacy was the decision of his state and duty demanded he abide that decision and thus through the struggle he wore the Confederate uniform and defended the Stars and Bars.

November 26, 1868 he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Sue Gibbs who preceded his departure, some seven years. This union was blessed with six children, three of whom died in infancy. The family came to Missouri and from there to Kansas in 1883. He located in Grove-land township, McPherson county and remained there until 1901 when he moved to McPherson where he. has since resided. While he was residing in the Groveland township and under the ministry of Rev. Walker he was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal church of which he was a member at the time of his decease.

He is survived by three daughters:

Napoleon Kaufman, my grandfather, was as far as I have found out, the first of the Swiss Tolhynian Mennonites from Russia to buy land in King City Township and move north from Turkey Creek and Mound townships where most of the Swiss Mennanites settled some staying in the Immigrant House provided by the Santa Fe Railroad when they came in Oct, 1974.

Napoleon bought 360 acres from A.G. Smith, one of the members of the Ashtabula settlers of King City. 120 acres of this was on sec. 26 on the east side of the section on which King City had been established and 240 acres on section 25 of King City Township. The aforesaid 120 acres is where I Bill Juhnke have lived since I was four years of age as my father Ernest Juhnke and his wife Alvina (Kaufman) the eldest of Napoleon's daughters, bought that from Napoleon in 1914. He Napoleon had bought it from A.G. Smith on Jan. 14, 1901.

Napoleon and Fannie continued to live on Sec. 25 until 1912, the year I was born, and then bought 20 acres just on the east edge of Moundridge. They eventually retired on property in Moundridge just to the east of the school building, Lots 9, 10, 11, and 12 of the old town site.

Napoleon could speak four languages, German, Russian, Polish, and English

There is a picture of him and the family in the Moundridge Journal of November 23, 1977, and a short article giving additional information.

An Introduction:

In the summer of 1977 a plan to move the No. Routhean Family Reunion from August to Thanksgiving time was proposed by a committee composed of Arlan Kaufman, Chairman, Erna Goering Stucky, and Wayne Do Stucky.

The idea was to try to puta part of the story of the

ine idea was to try to pure part of the story of the family, esp. of the first generation in America, into dialogue form and acted out as a part of the got-together.

On Sun. Aug. 7, Wayne came to sae Bill Juhnke to find whether he would consider compiling and writing such a piece with inputs from others. He not with the committee and the two remaining members of the N.R. Fannie family, Menno S. Kaufman and Marie, Mrs. Christ S. Goering, on Aug. 15, Sept. 11, Sept. 25, Cct. 17, and 30.

A questionnaire helped get information from the family, Initially the committee meetings were a sharing of memories and stories and eventually portions were used, cancelled, revived, etc.

One of the earliest questions was whether to use the English Fannie or the German Frent. The latter had been used in the home but Fannie appears on the gravestone at Hopefield in its Americanized form.

Some "harmless phantasy" appears in the script in order to bring the story to life. Each bit is hence not fully authentic or historical in a narrow sense. An example is "Napoleon's letter" in Act I, scene 2. It is thought that Napoleon's passport and many private papers burned in a fire at Jake's house in September, 1935;



Part I. The first 31 years - N.R. Kaufman's biography as recorded at age thirty one, in 1893

Introduction - "The Portrait and Biographical Record of Four Counties: McPherson, Marion, Saline, and Dickinson", recorded more than four hundred biographies of early settlers from these four counties. Three of these recorded biographies are of Swiss Volkymian Mennonite background including that of Napoleon Robert Kaufman in the prime of life - age 31 years. "Portrait and Biographical Record" also collected the attainable facts.

Of Special Interest - This biography is of special interest since it was written during N.R. Kaufman's prime. This kind of record in the prime of life perpetuates much information which might otherwise in later years be forgotten or distorted. (The paragraph headings have been inserted by the writer).

So let's turn the time clock back some 91 years (1984 to 1893) and experience what the McPherson County record tells us about Napoleon Robert Kaufman at age 31 and his family as was recorded 91 years ago in his prime:

His broad interests - Napoleon Robert Kaufmann, a prosperous farmer and highly respected citizen now residing upon section 24, Turkey Creek Township, McPherson County, has held various important official positions of trust since he located in this enterprising State and became a permanent dweller within its borders. Our subject is an ardent advocate of the benefits of a

higher education for the masses, is an energetic worker in one of the prominent church organizations, and in all things connected with the progress and upward growth of his neighborhood and county, has proved a valuable and most efficient factor.

His heritage - Born in the government of Volhynia, Russia, in 1862, our subject emigrated with his parents and their family to America in 1877. The father, Joseph, and the mother, Katie (Goering) Kaufmann, were the parents of thirteen children, but two of whom now survive, Napoleon and Joseph. Hard-working and industrious people and more than ordinarily intelligent, they realized that in the land of freedom beyond the sea there were hopeful possibilities for the future of their children which could never be attained in the despotic country of the Czar. They had but little means, but they were well known to be honest and true, and some kindly friend loaned them the money to pay their passage. Sixteen years have come and gone, and the father is still a living witness of the prosperity and welfare of his son, Napoleon, but the mother passed to her rest in 1887.

His youth - Our subject was the youngest of the large family of children, and was but fifteen years old when he arrived in the United States. Napoleon R. Kaufmannwas an ambitious and studious boy, and had well improved the advantages of the instruction he received in his native land. He speaks with ease four languages, conversing fluently in Russian, German, Pelish, and English. (Insert - On April 19, 1878, Napoleon Robert Kaufmann was baptized upon confession of his faith in Jesus Christ, his Lord and Savior, in the Hopefield Church by Elder (Pastor) Jacob Stucky.) In 1883, having attained his twenty-first birthday, he married Miss Fannie, a daughter of Rev. Jacob Stucky, minister of the Hopefield Church. Her mother's maiden name was Annie Waltner.

His family at 31 years (1893) - Mrs. Kaufmann is a native of the same government in Russia as her husband and came to America with her parents. She is a lady highly esteemed and the mother of six children, five of whom are living. The sons and daughters are Alvine, Leonard Garfield, Jacob Robert, Katie and Joseph Bernhard, bright, promising little ones clustering in the happy home. (Insert - Napoleon Robert was born in the colony of Beresufka and Miss Fannie was born in the colony of Kotosowka (Kotosufka) in the Province of Volhymia, Russia.)

His success as a farmer - In 1889, Mr. Kaufmann settled on the farm where he now resides and is actively engaged in the pursuit of agriculture. Our subject owns one hundred and sixty acres of valuable land, one hundred and twenty of which are under a high state of cultivation. The intelligent and prudent management of his farm has continually increased its productiveness and is a striking example of the success of the capable tiller of the soil.

His leadership and religious pursuits - The duties of a general agriculturist are never ceasing, but Mr. Kaufmann finds time in which to accomplish much religious and political work, and is also ever ready to lend a helping hand in the various enterprises of his town and county. Our subject is certainly a most important factor in the conduct of the Sunday school of the Mennonite Church, to which both he and his wife belong. As Sunday school teacher, he fills a most useful and responsible position with great ability.

His civic leadership - Politically, Mr. Kaufmann is a Republican, and is at present serving his fourth term as Trustee of the township. He was also

Township Clerk one term, and in both positions evinced excellent judgment, energy and ability. That his intelligent efforts in behalf of the public good and welfare are highly appreciated by friends and neighbors is plainly evinced from his long retention in the position which he held so many continuous terms. Our subject has also been a member of the School Board for six years, and as a Director in his school district has materially aided in raising the standard of instruction.

Esteem - A useful, honored and upright citizen, Mr. Kaufmann is well worthy of the esteem and confidence awarded him by friends and neighbors. (Insert-N.R. Kaufman was secretary of the Hopefield Church for some years prior to his election as minister of said church in 1895.)

Part II. N.R. Kaufman from 32 years of age, 1894 to 1929, his departure to eternal life at age 67.

Introduction This information is stated as recorded in the centennial publication (1874-1974) of the Hopefield Church. See The Challenging Faith, Part C. Supplement C. p. 126-127.

The Hopefield Church is the first Swiss German Mennonite Volhynian (from the last location in Russia) congregation in Kansas. It is also identified as the Hoffnungsfeld Gemeinde.

Twenty-three years in ministry at Hopefield - On Mar. 23, 1895 N.R. Kaufman was elected as minister in the Hopefield Church and ordained on June 30 of the same year. Eight years he served the church in this capacity. Then he was called by the church to serve as elder and was ordained by Elder J.J. Flickinger on April 10, 1904. With God's help he served the church as elder for 15 years until April 1, 1918.

Baptismal record - During the 15 years as elder, Rev. N.R. Kaufman baptized 107 persons: 94 as members of the Hopefield Church, 13 in the Springfield Church, Eakly Cade, Oklahoma.

Western District Conference - In the Western District Conference, he was especially active for many years. He served faithfully in the committee dealing with church problems (Gemeinde Angelegenheiten) for six years. He had a deep cencern in the well-being of different Mennonite congregations.

Church roll - During this twenty-three years of ministry (1895-1918) under the leadership of Elder N.R. Kaufman and assistant Rev. John J. Stucky, the church prospered materially and spiritually and it experienced normal growth in membership.

Church concern - They were a blessing to the church, led in Bible study, directed many to Christ. They spoke trust and hope at sick beds, the dying they directed to eternal life. They were concerned about the poor and had a major interest in welfare and well-doing.

Resignation - On Mar. 27, 1917, Elder N.R. Kaufman resigned as elder and Rev. John J. Stucky resigned as minister of the Hoffnungsfeld Gemeinde after 23 years of service because of circumstances regarding the plan for unification of the Hopefield Church and the Hopefield Eden Church. This unification

which both ministers highly desired was under consideration. The resignation was to be effective when a new elder was ordained.

Minister and Elder of Garden Township Church - On April 1, 1918, Prof. Gustav Ensz, professor at Bethel College, was ordained by Elder N.R. Kaufman as minister and elder of the Hopefield Church. The Garden Township Church had already given Elder N.R. Kaufman a call on April 17, 1917, to serve as elder and minister. After his services terminated at the Hopefield Church, he served in this capacity for five years, then discontinued the ministry on account of ill health.

Residential locations - They made their first home about four miles west and one-half mile north of what is now Moundridge, Kansas, or about one-half mile west of the Hopefield Church. Later, they bought a farm near Elyria, Kansas, and eventually retired to Moundridge, Kansas.

The family - This union was blessed with 10 children: two preceded him in death. Children born after 1893 were Anna - 1894, David - 1896, Maria - 1900, and Menne (the current writer) - 1905. As of Nov. 1, 1984, the two surviving children are Maria and Menno.

<u>Called heme by Lord and Master</u> - On March 30, 1929, after an extended illness, Elder N.R. Kaufman passed into the beyond at the age of 67 years, 2 months, and 24 days. He continued his membership in the Hopefield Church until his death in 1929.

Funeral servace - At the funeral service, Rev. M. Horsch preached on the subject, "There will be no night there," Rev. 21: 25b. Rev. Pete Wedel centered his remarks on Romans 8: 29, "Nothing...shall be able to separate us from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Lord." Rev. Phil Wedel spoke on Psalm 116:15, "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His saints." The following ministers were pall bearers: J.M. Suderman, H. Riesen, C.J. Goering, J.J. Flickner, J.M. Janzen, and P.K. Regier. The body was interred in the Hopefield Cometery.

Freni (Fannie) Stucky Kaufman, his wife, was called home by her Lord and Master on Feb. 6, 1933, nearly four years later, at the age of 69 years, 3 months, and 16 days.

Part III. How I remember Dad -

As a small boy, I felt his love and concern. If he did farm work in the yard I would like to be near him. If he was too busy to engage in conversation, he would address me with a favorite expression. "Bon Jings Noch Mohl" to keep me around. I did not know what the words meant, but to me they expressed a deep love and concern. I always looked forward to that fellowship and would stay near when Dad was too busy to encounter me in conversation, just to hear him say, "Bon Jings Noch Mohl!"

Discipline was firm - Imagine being at the very tail end of a large family. At age 5, my youngest sister Marv was 10. Anna was 16, and the rest of the family full grown. One day I was guilty of some mischevious behavior. My recollection fails me on the specific offense. The consequence, however,

made a lasting impression. Dad just happened to enter the house at the wrong time. Seeing Dad come in, my guilt put me instinctively into a rapid crawl heading under the table, hoping to escape my earned punishment. We almost made it! Excepting that Dad grabbed the one lagging hind leg as we were going under and pulled me out. The lesson was quite obvious. There is no security under the table -- not even today.

My life priorities were deeply rooted in my home training - As I grew to maturity I recall no harsh words or impatience on the part of my parents as I wrestled with the problems of Faith and Values. For the Hopefield church I developed a deep concern. The Mennonite Faith became vary important to me. Later in life under my leadership as a Public School Administrator, we introduced religious education into the schools - one hour per week under the respective denominational leadership. Examples are 1)In Lehigh Public Schools where most students were of Mennonite background; 2) In Hanover Pubnic Schools with varied backgrounds - Catholic, Missouri Synod Lutheran, Lutheran, and Evangelical Churches.

Also, my activity as a Sunday School teacher throughout the years is evidence of the influence of Dad and Mom, Rev. N.R. and Froni (Freni, Fannie) Kaufman. In conclusion - I am very grateful for that heritage.

Part IV. Additional Lineage Information -

- I. Why trace ancestral lineage of N.R. Kaufman to Peter Kaufman and Elizabeth Graber Kaufman?
- 1. Peter Kaufman and Elizabeth Graber Kaufman (newly weds of nine days) left their adopted ancestral home land of France of some 120 years and all their Kaufman relatives for Poland to a new geneological beginning Kaufman family tree. They became the ancestral stem of all Swiss, German, Volhynian (last dwelling province in Russia) descendants that came to Kansas and South Dakota in 1874.
- 2. They were issued a possport, which described them as Swiss German people and anabaptist, together with four other family names from the buchy of Wuerttembery at Moempelgard (Montbeliard) France on Feb. 8, 1791, who were on their way to Poland in the service of Prince Adam Czartorinsky.
- 3. The travel route of Peter and Elizabeth and descendants, with others of their faith: From Montbeliard France to Einsiedel Austria in 1791, to Michelsdorf Poland in 1797, then to Russia as follows to Edwardsdorf in 1815, to Horoditsz (Horodish, Horodisch) and Waldheim in 1837, to Kotusowka (Kotosufka) in 1861. In 1874 they immigrated to Kansas and South Dakota.
- II. Peter Kaufman's (the ancestral stem) birth date of 1770 Reference: Kaufman geneology by Mrs. Charles (Lydia Unruh) Schrag of Freeman, South Dakota.
- III. Joseph Kaufmann's (Napoleon Robert's father) birth date The tombstone date is 1810. Peter Kaufman geneology chart records his birthdate as 1813. We accepted the 1810 date assuming the children had the correct birth date of their father.
- IV. Peter Kaufman's ancestral migration from Switzerland to France This likely occurred during the peak anabaptist persecution in Switzerland in 1671.

V. Extended geneology - See 1) N.R. and Fannie Faufman Family Record 2) Extension of this family record by Mr. M.S. Kaufman, Mrs. Alma (Schrag) Kaufman - his wife, and daughter Donna Neufeld.

VI. Four spellings of Kaufman: (as recorded in this ancestral lineage) Kauffmann, Kaufmann, Kaufman, Kaufman

VII. In Part I, The first 31 years, under the heading - His Heritage, is this comment on the following statement: "The father Joseph, and the mother Katie (Goering) Kaufman, were the parents of thirteen children..." Current records state that six children were born to this union: Maria (Kaufman) Stucky, Carolina (Kaufman) Dirks, Joseph, Freni(Kaufman) Kind, Adolph (died in Russia) and Napoleon Robert (the youngest son, born in 1862). Is it possible that some children referred to in the thirteen died as infants and were not recorded in the current records?


